# Payroll tax gambit Social Security survival threatened

The life of both Social Security and its Disability Insurance program are in danger of extinction according to a letter in late August from the programs chief actuary.

In a letter to U.S. Sen. Ron Wyden, one of four senators who requested an estimate of the impact of President Trump's payroll tax cut, Stephen Goss wrote that the Old Age and Sur-

Sadly, the Oregon Supreme Court has now unanimously upheld Senate Bill 1049, the so-called PERS "reform" that took part of the contribution to the pension funds of active members and redirected it to paying down the debt.

That was bad news for those still employed by the state, since it means a reduction in their pensions when they retire.

It will *not* affect those already retired, but it represents an unfortunate setback to all our friends and colleagues still working.

That decision, combined with the Pandemic and formidable unrest over the George Floyd murder, will almost certainly push further PERS "reforms" pretty far off the legislative table, at least in the short term.

AFT and other unions were furious with them over the "reforms" in Senate Bill 1049, and they are still smarting from that. Of course, the main session early next year could be a different story, as state agencies battle over a much smaller pot of money, and we will have to stay vigilant to make sure that legislators do not again try to violate the contract the state has made with us in the past.

The Legislature recently held a special session devoted entirely to police reform and Covid-19 issues. There were worries a second special session in August might look at further PERS cuts. It did not. The second special session was devoted to balancing the budget after it was thrown into crisis by the plunge in revenues caused by lockdowns and closures.

In one legislative bill it did further address policing, adopting HB 4301 on use of "choke holds" by police and corrections officers, and use of physical force and deadly force by police officers.

As always, that means that all of those reading this report should stay involved, alert, and active! Question candidates and vote, vote, vote!

vivor's Insurance trust fund would permanently run out of funds by mid-2023. The letter added that the Disability Insurance funds would run out even earlier, in mid-2021. Goss' letter explained there then would be no money to pay to disabled workers, their spouses and children qualifying for benefits.

The President issued an Executive Order in early August for a temporary break in the payroll tax, but vowed later to make it permanent if he is re-elected. Given that prospect, the Senators requested the estimates, which are based on the change effective January 1, 2021.

The payroll tax of 6.2 percent for Social Security and 1.45 percent for Medicare is paid each by the employee and the employer on wages and salaries up to a maximum for 2020, of \$137,000. Many have

argued that the cap itself should be removed. The President's order would temporarily suspend the withholdings on those earning less that \$100,000 annually, but require they be paid back next year, prompting his vow to make them permanent.

The Executive Order was one of four signed by the President amid his fight with Congress as a substitute for a legislative agreement between the House, Senate, and the White House. Along with the deferral in payroll tax, the orders provide an interest break for those with student loans, that as well have to be paid back in 2021.

In another end run around Congress, another order authorized \$400 additional weekly unemployment benefits, but requiring states to pay \$100 of that. Oregon and Washington have been approved for the \$300, but may not add the additional \$100. Only Six states have begun paying so far.
